

National Police Academy (NPA), formerly known as Central Police Training Center (CPTC), is the apex police training institution in Nepal since its inception in 1956 A.D.



NPA also coordinates with national as well as international training institutions to advance in sync with the international standards and practices. 








The foundation of Central Police Training Centre (CPTC) was laid in 1954 A.D. It was located in Shree Mahal, Lalitpur. It had its distinct identity as an only institution devoted to train the police force. During its inception years, the CPTC had remained engaged in Police Constable training despite its limited resources and training facilities.



















NPA is planning to construct the state-of-the-art and technically sophisticated academic complex in Panauti of Kavrepalanchok district of Nepal. 
















Police Inspector Basic Training 181st Batch In Figures





6 Virtualization

Need of the Hour

NPA prioritises modernization and standardisation of its training activities. The outbreak of COVID-19 in Nepal and its sustained presence forced the NPA to suspend its training activities for more than six months. The outburst of the COVID pandemic resulted in the cancellation and suspension of the training activities planned to be conducted in the NPA. It adversely affected in the implementation of the training calendar.

In this backdrop, with the financial assistance of the United Nations Office for Project Services, the virtual training capability of the National Police Academy was strengthened by establishing a virtual training classroom and conducting two batches of Gender Responsive Investigation and Communication Skills (GRICS) using the platform.

The virtual training capacity has also helped the NPA to embrace the avenues offered by modern technologies in the capacity building of its personnel in an easy, effective and economic way.

Setting Benchmarks

Training Manual Development



In the pursuit of strengthening the foundational training programs of Nepal Police, the National Police Academy, with the support of the United Nations Office for Project Services, has developed training manuals for the basic training of Police Constable, Assistant Sub-Inspector and Inspector of Police. The availability of standardised training materials in the form of training manuals is expected to make durable positive impact on the quality and uniformity of basic training programs in all training centers across the country.

The training manuals include Instructor Guidebook and Participant Guidebook for each subject. For the Basic Training program of Police Constable, Participant Guidebook and Instructor Guidebook have been developed on six subjects viz. Police Operations and Crime Control, Crime Investigation and Existing Laws, Security, Police Tactics and Operations, Introduction to Nepal and Nepal Police and a booklet on miscellaneous police activities.

For the ASI Basic Training, Participant Guidebook and Instructor Guidebook have been developed on five subjects viz. Police Organization and Law, Police Operations and Public Order, Crime Investigation, Police Management, and Police Tactics and Operations.

For Inspector Basic Program, the training manuals have been developed on eleven subjects. Participant Guidebook and Presentation Slides have been developed on the subjects viz. General Police Administration, Laws Relating to Police, Jurisprudence and Criminal Law, Forensic Science and Medicine, Management and Leadership, Public Peace and Order, Security, Information Technology, Crime Prevention Management, Crime Investigation, and Basic Police Tactics and Operation. For the Inspector Basic Program, the training manuals also include Exercise Guide for subjects having practical sessions.

Police Training Institutions

Nepal Police Detective Training School

Nepal Police Detective Training School (NPDTS) shares the premises and infrastructure of NPA. NPDTS is the central institution to conduct trainings in the field of crime investigation. It has been organizing training courses on crime management and crime investigation with special focus on scientific and technological aids to investigation. It also emphasizes on trainings related to law and procedures and professional skills and knowledge.











Nepal Police College, Bharatpur

Nepal Police College was established in 2014 A.D. in Bharatpur, Chitwan. The college was specifically developed as a specialized training center to train the JCOs. This College is mainly focused on conducting foundation training courses for fresh recruits at the rank of Assistant Sub-Inspector of Police and Advanced Courses to JCOs from across the country. Additionally, it has also been contributing in training other junior ranks as mandated by the organization.





























Metropolitan Police Training School, Maharajgunj

Metropolitan Police Training School (MPTS), Maharajgunj was established in 2067 B.S. with the aim of providing and delivering quality training to Police Constables for basic course and other mid-career training programs focusing Junior Officers, Head Constables and Constables working under the Metropolitan Police Office, Ranipokhari. MPTS conducts different recruitment examinations of Assistant Sub-Inspectors, Police Constables and Police Office Assistants.











Province No. 1 Police Training Center, Biratnagar

Province No. 1 Police Training Center, Biratnagar was established in 1967 in Dharan and later relocated to Metropolitan city, Biratnagar in 1977. It conducts Basic Training for newly recruited Police Constables and Advanced Trainings on crime investigation, police operations, police management and administrations for Junior Police Officers and lower ranks working in various police units under Province No. 1 Police Office, Biratnagar.













Madhesh Province Police Training Center, Janakpur

Madhesh Province Police Training Center, Janakpur was established as a contact office in Rajbiraj in 2075 B.S. The Training Center is one of the two youngest training centers in the country. It has been providing training on crowd control, investigation of crime, community policing and security to the police personnel raning from Police Constable to Junior Police Officers of Madhesh Province.













Bagmati Province Police Training Center, Sindhuli

Bagmati Province Police Training Center, Sindhuli was established in the year 1982 at Prachanda Bhawan, Kathmandu and later transferred to Bharatpur, chitwan in 1988. Again it was relocated in Dudhauli of Sindhuli District in 2015. It has been conducting different Basic and Advanced Training to the police personnel in the area of investigation police operations and administrations since its establishment.













Gandaki Province Police Training Center, Pokhara

Gandaki Province Police Training Center was established in 2018 A.D. in Pokhara - 15, Dhungesangu, Thulimajuwa. The Training Center is one of the two youngest Training Centers of Nepal. It has been conducting basic and advanced training courses to police personnel ranging from Police Constables to Junior Police Officers of the police units of 11 districts of Gandaki Province.









Lumbini Province Police Training Center, Butwal

Lumbini Province Police Training Center was established in the year 1976 A.D. as 'Western Regional Police Training Centre' and initially renamed as Province No. 5 Police Training Center but later on 2020 A.D. it was confirmed as its current name. It provides training courses on Police Operation, Crime Investigation, Police administration and Security to Junior Police Officers, Head Constables and Constables of the Lumbini Province.















Karnali Province Police Training Center, Surkhet

Then Mid-Western Police Training Centre was transformed to Karnali Province Police Training Center in the year 2075 B.S. after the federal restructuring of the country with the promulgation of the Constitution of Nepal (2072). Since construction of the Training Center in Karnali Province is still under preliminary phase, it is currently located in Nepalgunj of Banke District. It is involved in training for newly recruited Police Constables and also providing in-service training to personnel ranging from Police Constable to Junior Commissioned Officers working in Karnali Province.











Sudurpaschim Province Police Training Center, Dipayal

Sudurpaschim Province Police Training Center, Dipayal was established in 2039 B.S. as Far West Regional Police Training Center and later reconstituted in 2018 A.D. in consonance with the federal restructuring of the state. It focuses in recruitment and basic training of Police Constables and conducts various Advanced Trainings for Junior Police Officers, Head Constables and Police Constables working in Sudurpaschim Province.





























Nepal Police Music School Maharajgunj

Nepal Police Music School (NPMS) was established in 2009 B.S. as Central Police Band Company and later renamed in 2063 B.S. as it is. NPMS serves the ceremonial needs with their performances at national events and various police functions. It has five major branches viz Pipe and Drums, Reet Brass Precussion, Bugle, *Panche Baja* and Dance and Music. The school also plays a vital role in preserving & promoting traditional musical instruments of Nepal.


